The following article is from the November 1937 edition of the <u>The Buzzer</u>, Springville School Newspaper.

History of the New Gymnasium

Springville has every reason to be proud of its new gymnasium and one of those reasons is the whole -hearted co-operation of all those who shared in its inception and building.

Do not think that the building you see each day is the result of one concerted action to secure for you greater opportunities. It is the culmination of plans and dreams and hopes that go back for many years. The early basketball players had their handicaps and aspirations. But their wildest hopes scarcely foresaw as splendid a building as we have now.

It must have been in 1933 that definite suggestions were made about building a gymnasium. A visit to several near—by gymnasiums revealed that problems existed—in planning and financing, managing; but nothing concrete occurred until 1935. In that year the trustee, Mr. Jackson, hoped to let the dream materialize. He named a committee to secure signers to a petition, with the plan that should 51% of the taxable property appear on the petition, he would plan to erect such a building through taxation. The committee, however, secured representation of only about 35% of the taxable property, and the scheme failed.

Another plan was devised. It might be called a "donation" plan as a committee asked for and received subscriptions for donation of material for a building. But about this time there began to be talk about W.P.A. projects, in which the trustee was sponsor for the labor. So another committee consisting of Ralph Hert, Lester Hayes, Dennis Armstrong, and Charles Stevenson was appointed by the trustee to look into this possibility. There were no funds for expenses, and finally Henry Pearson, as that time City Engineer of Bedford, agreed to draw plans for the structure and agreed to receive payment therefor "when as and if" the grant were made and the building contrasted.

The next problem was that of choice of material. Wood, brick, and tile were suggested. Each presented problems of price and durability. A chance visit to the shelter house at Wilson Park put "a bee in the bonnet", and thus came the suggestion of using field stone.

With the plans drawn and the building in sight—almost— the project was filed in the last days on November, 1935. The government agreed to supply the labor, steel reinforcing, steel trusses, and 200 barrels of cement, all valued at \$26,550. The township's share for material other than as specified above was estimated at \$5,299

Then utter silence followed. In January, "Yes, it is still under construction", was the information given out. In March the County Superintendent reported the project had been approved and the trustee signed an agreement to complete the plans as outlined before June 30, so far as was possible.

Meanwhile, Ralph Carmichael, of Bedford, donated his services to break down the plans and estimate the amount of material the sponsor would need to furnish. He fixed the cost at \$5,000. To raise this amount a bond issue was decided upon and in April, preliminary moves were made, and finally, on the 8th of July, the bond issue was sold, the entire proceeds amounting to \$5,189.66.

With the bond issue under way during April there was a great excitement in Perry Township, but another silence of the authorities ensued. Before any further action occurred, the District Manager at Vincennes received some callers, three members of the committee, another member of the Advisory Board, and Mr. Jackson. These men were informed that if the started work immediately, the project would receive further consideration as an "unfinished project", on June 30. There was no delay in hauling several loads of field stone, and soon on the school yard heaps of stones of all sizes and shapes were appearing.

Actual work began on June 16, 1936. When school opened in September, tangible results were seen, for long ditches indicated where foundations were to be poured, heaps of sand and gravel invited youngsters to play, and the great piles of stone made the project seem a reality.

Springville has every reason to be proud of its new gymnasium, and one of those reasons is the whole-hearted co-operation of all those who shared in its inception and building.

Springville Girl Scouts Craft Sale


